A busy Summer debating Planning Applications

The Town Council is strongly opposed to any development in the Tud Valley. The application to build 83 dwellings on a field north of Farmland Road was due to be determined by South Norfolk Council in July, but at 3pm on the day before the Development Management Committee met, we were advised the applicant had requested more time to respond to some of the concerns raised by the Action Group.
